






Millions of Americans Don't Have Reliable Broadband

- •17 million Americans do not have basic broadband @ 25/3 Mbps.
- •20.9% of Tribal lands and 17.2% of rural lands do not have 25/3 Mbps broadband.
- While 95.6% of households have access to 25/3 Mbps broadband, only 68.9% of households subscribe to service at that level or above.



Red areas indicate where wireline broadband service is unavailable at the basic FCC benchmark speed of 25/3 Mbps based on FCC Form 477 carrier-reported data.








Broadband Adoption is Uneven Across Communities

- 65 million Americans do not use the Internet at all.
- 10 million Internet users rely solely on a mobile data plan.
- 5 Million households not online identified cost as their main reason for not using the Internet.
- Under-connected Americans are disproportionally likely to be lowincome, non-white, rural, Tribal, older, and differently-abled.








It's Time to Invest in the American Workforce

CMC Pilot Program Overview of Final Rule

<u>Eligible Entities – Act directed NTIA to develop new methods to establish and verify CMC eligibility:</u>

- 1) Identify and verify that an applicant is an HBCU, TCU, or MSI (eligible recipient).
- 2) Identify and map **anchor communities** that are within a 15-mile radius of each eligible HBCU, TCU, or MSI and that meets the estimated median annual household income of not more than 250 percent of the poverty threshold.
- 3) In consultation with the Secretary of the Interior, determine a comparable maximum distance for TCU anchor community located on land held in trust by the United States is statistically comparable to anchor communities defined as not more than 15 miles from an HBCU, TCU or MSI (where applicable).
- 4) Identify which eligible recipients have the greatest unmet financial need.
- 5) Verify that a designated Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) or a Tax-Exempt 501(c)(3) Organization applying as a member of the consortium is an eligible entity (consortium applicants).

<u>"Anchor Community"</u> means <u>any area</u> that is: (i) not more than 15 miles from a HBCU, a TCU, or a MSI; and (ii) has an estimated median annual household income of not more than 250 percent of the poverty line.

- ✓ The 250 percent threshold will be determined for household size based on the 2019 poverty thresholds available from the U.S. Census Bureau
- ✓ The 250 percent poverty threshold by household size will then be applied to the average household size in each census tract according to the 2015-2019 American Community Survey data (U.S. Census Bureau).
- ✓ Utilizing capabilities within the NBAM platform, a 15-mile buffer will be drawn around each eligible institution as described above
- ✓ A digital overlay will be used to select all census tracts for each anchor community boundary. The median household income in each anchor community census tract will be compared to the 250 percent poverty threshold as defined above to determine if the anchor community tract does not exceed the prescribed poverty threshold







CMC Eligible Entities | Greatest Unmet Financial Need

To determine which eligible recipients have students with the greatest unmet financial needs, each applying eligible institution must provide the following information in their application for funding, to include any supplementary information to explain the data:

- (i) Student population size;
- (ii) Number and percentage of students that are eligible to receive Federal Pell Grants;
- (iii) Number and percentage of students that receive other need-based financial aid from the Federal Government, a State, or that institution;
- (iv) Number and percentage of students that qualify as low-income consumers;
- (v) Number and percentage of students that are low-income individuals; and
- (vi) Number and percentage of students that have been approved to receive unemployment insurance benefits under any Federal or State law since March 1, 2020.

During the Merit Review phase, NTIA will analyze the submitted information for each of these criteria and will develop an assessment of each institution's student body-based unmet financial needs. These assessments will be ranked and compared across all submitted applications during the merit review phase and program eligibility determinations will be made based on an evaluation of the data provided and accompanying explanatory information. Final recommendations for project approval and grant funding will be made for those eligible anchor institutions that have demonstrated the greatest unmet financial need.







CMC| Program Requirements

- At least 40% of Grants Funds Awarded will be made to HBCUs
- •At least 20% of all Grants Funds Awarded to Eligible Entities must be used to provide broadband access and/or devices and equipment to students
- Eligible recipients that receive a grant <u>to provide broadband internet access service</u> <u>or eligible equipment to students</u> must prioritize students who are in need (per the needs criteria factors)
- Purchase or Lease of Equipment Eligible entities must prioritize any lending or providing of equipment to students and/or patrons who do not have access to such equipment






